## What Do You Do for the Community That Has Everything?

Friends, what do you do for the community that thinks it has everything? This has been one of the questions discussed by the vision team over the last year. Ann Arbor itself is a city that seems to need nothing. At the center of our city is one of the most powerful educational institutions in the United States. The demographics of Ann Arbor show a city full of young people, median age of 27-28 years old, and Ann Arbor consistently ranks as the most educated city in the United States. Household income too is over 10% above the state median average. Don't get me wrong; there are many people who have significant needs in our community. But Ann Arbor, broadly speaking, is a city that thinks it has everything: education, income, and professional fulfillment. So, what do we, as people of God in the Ann Arbor area, do for the city that has everything?

As a vision team, we've been talking about our long-term spiritual vision. How is God leading St. Paul into ministry with the Ann Arbor community over the next 5-7 years? One of our tasks is to figure out what problem we are going to address. What problem do we see in our congregation or in our community that we can work on together, unite in ministry together, by the grace of God and the movement of the Holy Spirit? In this way, the question of what we do for the city that has everything has been regularly in our prayers and at the front of our minds as we've listened to the congregation and discussed among ourselves where God is leading St. Paul.

In this process of discernment and prayer, we believe that God has led us to focus on the problem of disconnection, of alienation and loneliness. Ann Arbor is a community that may seem to have everything, but so many

# Celebrating Principal Bob Burgess

After 11 years of dedicated service to St. Paul School and 42 years in ministry, our Principal, Bob Burgess, will be retiring at the end of this school year.



Throughout his time at St. Paul Ann Arbor, Mr. Burgess has been a steady and faithful leader, guiding our preschool through 8th-grade community with wisdom, care, and a deep commitment to Christ-centered education. His passion for sharing Jesus' love with children and their families has made a lasting and meaningful impact.



Pastor Neuendorf remembers when Bob came to St. Paul. "I suppose it would sound disrespectful to make comparisons to a cartoon character, Bob the Builder, but I will always remember Bob for his passion for moving ahead. 'Yes, we can!' was the way that Bob approached improving the school, recruiting new students, elevating our performance, building our image, and especially leading children to know Jesus. He saw new uses for our old facility. He led the remodeling of the old music room to serve as a more useful and attractive multi-purpose space. He transformed what we always called "the small gym" into a true gathering space, not just a coat of paint and a renaming, but with a new vision for how our facility could be a warmer and more welcoming place.

"Bob was a solid partner during the hard pandemic year. That was difficult for all of us, but Bob kept ahead of the constantly changing demands in the education world and the public health requirements and he got things done when the pressure to



perform was especially high. That, I think, is what I most appreciated about Bob. When something needed to get done, his spirit was always, 'yes, we can!'"

Never one to stand still, Bob has consistently looked ahead—seeking ways to faithfully use the gifts and resources God has provided to strengthen our school and expand its impact. From hiring and calling dedicated, Christ-centered teachers and staff and improving on aging facilities, to encouraging SPAA's updated branding and the Serving Generations Building Campaign, his leadership has helped to shape our school and its future.



We are deeply grateful for Bob's servant leadership, his can-do spirit, and the strong foundation of faith he has helped cultivate within our school.

As he steps into retirement, we thank God for Mr. Burgess' many years of ministry and pray for His continued blessings in this next chapter. His legacy at St. Paul will not be forgotten.

people lack deep and meaningful relationships. Ann Arbor is a transient community with many moving in and moving out, which contributes to this problem of few meaningful relationships. And loneliness is an epidemic in the United States in general, declared so by the surgeon general in 2023. Half of Americans are afflicted by the problem of social isolation, and Ann Arbor's transience only makes this general problem worse. In addition, less than 32% of people in Washtenaw County are members of religious communities and lack any meaningful relationship with God. In short, God made us for relationships, but people in our community often lack meaningful relationships with others or with God.

If we are honest, St. Paul as a congregation hasn't always been the best at this either. Our last senior pastor search revealed that while we are warm and welcoming to those already on the inside, it can be difficult for newcomers to break in—often leaving them feeling isolated and alone. We have people within our church who need more connections, more relationship, not only a deeper faith in God but more unity and friendships with the people of God. I believe that we are doing better on this, friends! Yet, we still have more to do. God is calling us to dive into relationships with each other, to be warm, welcoming, and hospitable—all things that God has abundantly given to each of us in Christ Jesus. We want everyone who enters St. Paul to know they are seen, known, and loved by God and by us. And God has uniquely placed St. Paul in the Ann

Arbor area to extend this purpose those who haven't yet entered our community or might be just on the periphery as part of our school or preschool. God is calling us to create meaningful connections with people so that they might know God's grace in Jesus Christ in a community of love.

In the next few months, you'll begin to hear about our new vision that will challenge all of us to make meaningful connections with people: to welcome neighbors into community, to reach out to someone who needs a friend, to invite a neighbor into a small group, community group, Bible study, or to church. But, friends, why wait until you hear about the specific vision statement? God already loves you in Jesus with an everlasting love that He has poured out on you, and He pours out his grace on you by the Holy Spirit. God has brought you into the community of His church, into St. Paul, where you have friends who deeply care about you. Why not start to give this same gift away already today? The people in Ann Arbor—and our surrounding communities—need it.

## 3000 Eggs and 355 Kids - an Easter Celebration!

We were thrilled to welcome **241 families and 355 children** to our campus for this year's Easter Festival! It was a wonderful morning of celebration and community fun. Between the live petting zoo, crafts, the coffee truck, and the 3,000-egg scramble, it was a fantastic way to kick off the season with our neighbors.

As we looked back at the registration data, it was

clear that we reached far beyond our own walls:

### Welcoming New Neighbors:

About 37% of our guests were visiting us for the first time or joined us from outside our immediate church and school family.

### The Power of an Invitation:

Social media was a massive driver this year, helping 46% of families find us! At the same time, our personal community remains strong—31% of guests joined us because one of you personally invited them.

### The Next Generation:

Nearly 68% of the children in attendance were age 6 or

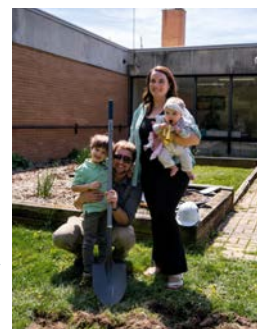

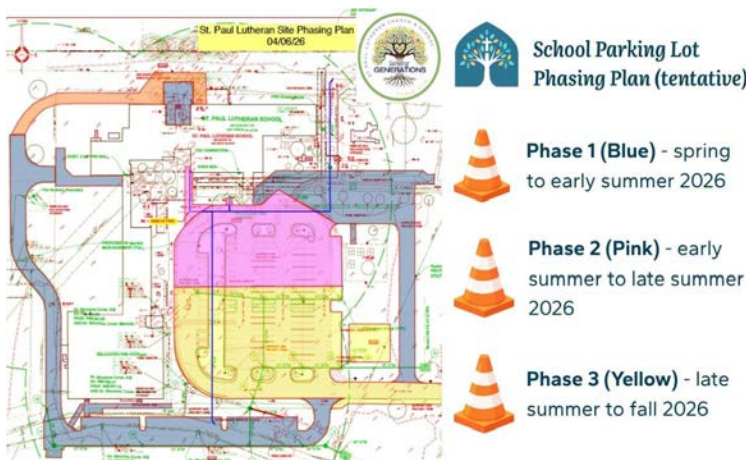

## Ok, so we've broken ground... now what?

Pending final permit approval from the City of Ann Arbor (anticipated late May), site work will begin right away! Here's what to expect:



## Parking Lot Construction (3 Phases):

- Phase 1 (Blue): Construction of new access roads, including a drop-off route and a required fire lane behind the building.
- Phase 2 (Pink): Replacement of the first half of the existing parking lot (closest to the school).
- Phase 3 (Yellow): Replacement of the remaining section near the gym.

Our goal is to have the parking lot as complete as possible by the start of the school year, though work will likely continue into early fall.

During this time, interior preparation work will also begin. Construction of the new building structure cannot start until site work is approximately 90% complete—so vertical building is expected later in the fall.

## Tentative Project Timeline

- Site Work (parking lot, roads, drainage, utilities):

May 2026 – Fall 2026

- Building Shell (new addition): Fall 2026 – Late Winter 2026/27
- Interior Construction (HVAC, fire protection, finishes): Winter 2026/27 – Late Spring 2027
- Final Renovations & Completion: Spring 2027 – Fall 2027

(Please note: all dates are tentative and subject to change.)

## What to Expect This Summer

Construction will be visible and active throughout the summer and into the fall. You can expect:

- Heavy equipment and construction materials on-site
- Temporary fencing and barriers
- At least 50% of the parking lot under construction at any given time

This will require patience, flexibility, and perhaps some creative parking on Sunday mornings. As new access roads are completed (early to mid-summer), additional temporary parking options may become available. We appreciate your flexibility during this time.

## Looking Ahead:

### How Can You Be Part of the Next Steps?

Approximately \$400,000 in pledged gifts from the original campaign are **still currently being collected**. In addition, future fundraising efforts will focus on furnishing the new media center and preschool classroom. **More details will be shared soon!**

# Hey Pastor: What's the Difference Between Alleluia and Hallelujah?

**Alleluia! Christ is risen!  
He is risen indeed! Alleluia!**

Blessed Eastertide, everyone! ("tide" comes from the Old English way of saying 'time' or 'season'. The hymn, "This Joyful Eastertide," LSB 482, written in 1894, also uses this phrase.) During this season, we shout and sing Alleluias repeatedly. Appropriately, I was asked this "Hey, Pastor" question on Easter Sunday morning. It's understandable, because in the 9:00 service, we used Alleluia throughout the service until the choir sang the Hallelujah Chorus from Handel's Messiah as the Postlude. So what's going on here? Why the difference? And can you teach me some Greek, Hebrew, and Latin along the way?

## HALELU-YAH

First of all, the word is originally a Hebrew compound word meaning "Praise Yahweh" or "Praise the LORD." The Hebrew word Halal (ללה) means "Praise." When Halal is combined with God's name, Yahweh (הוהי), we get the word Hallelujah. (Fun fact: Yahweh is written as LORD in small caps when this name of God occurs in the Old Testament). Hallelujah (הי יוללה) appears 23 times in the Old Testament and only in the last third of the book of Psalms. Many of these Psalms were written for Temple worship. Psalms 113-118 were especially sung during the Passover season. And Psalm 150 appropriately concludes the book of Psalms, calling on all people to praise Yahweh. (Praise the LORD - Hallelujah!)

## WHAT ABOUT IN THE NEW TESTAMENT?

The word, transliterated into Greek, is similarly pronounced "hal-lay-loo-ee-ah" (ἀλληλουϊά). This word only occurs four times in the New Testament, all in Revelation 19:1-6, as the multitude gathers around Yahweh's throne and praises Him, proclaiming what He's done. I know this is all Greek to you, but bear with me for a minute. This Greek word is then often written in English as "Hallelujah" - that apostrophe on top of the alpha (α) at the beginning of the word (ἀλληλουϊά) indicates that the alpha is spoken with rough breathing, or an "h" sound. The alternative, an apostrophe facing the opposite direction (ᾶ), would indicate that the word is spoken with a soft "a" sound...



## WHY ALLELUIA WITH AN A AND NOT AN H?

In the 1st and 2nd centuries AD, many people spoke Latin along the coasts of Northern Africa. To spread the gospel and share the Bible in these areas, the Bible was translated into Latin so that this population could read it. The Vetus Latina, the translation of the Bible into Latin in the 2nd Century (the 100s AD), is likely the earliest Latin translation of the Bible into another language, aside from Greek and Hebrew. In this manuscript, Revelation 19:1 records the word proclaimed to Yahweh, transliterated into Latin as "alleluia." "Alleluia" is translated the same way in the Latin Vulgate of the 4th Century AD, the same period when Latin replaced Greek as the language of the Roman Empire and became the primary language of the church. This led to the common "alleluia" spelling in worship, even though "Hallelujah (with a soft "j" like a "y" sound) is actually the way the word is pronounced in Hebrew and Greek.

## WOW, I'M GLAD I ASKED

And I'm glad you did, too. I actually didn't know much about the Vetus Latina translation until looking deeper into this.

In the end, when we use this term in worship, whether we say Alleluia or Hallelujah, what we're really saying is Praise Yahweh. And we can certainly praise Him this Eastertide and every day, because Christ is Risen!

I was so thankful and I truly got to see the heart of this team. They have such an incredible love for Jesus and such a passion for sharing His love and wisdom. It was awe inspiring to witness. They have taken so much time to truly get to know and understand the culture they are living in and the most effective ways to share the love of Jesus. One of the pastors spoke on this and shared how important it is to understand the culture they are in. Witchcraft is a prominent practice as well as some local churches taking

advantage of the hearts of Jesus' people with false teachings. Therefore the missionaries must be knowledgeable of this as well as the character, struggles, upbringing, and language of the people of this culture. This takes some true commitment and wisdom! Each team member has such character, strength, and faith that Jesus is there, present, and working through them. We were able to hear each of the pastors along with their incredible wives speak and share what they are doing to build God's kingdom. These congregations are growing so fast and the team is working so hard to continue doing God's work. They are bringing Jesus to people in several different ways.

Outreach to the community is a huge focus and they do this through many special events. They also have a beautiful room connected to the church where children can come after school to play, along with disaster relief efforts, English classes, and a Lutheran podcast hosted by Pastor James Neuendorf. The team continues to work together to create events and opportunities to bring people to Jesus.

During the conference we heard countless stories of people learning the truth of Jesus for the first time, being so hungry to learn more, and then deciding to become a part of His family through baptism. One of the stories shared at the conference was about a young girl (around the age of 10). This is my daughter's age - so this story really touched me. She first learned about Jesus through taking an English class the mission team offers at Source of Life in Ponce. She was so in awe of Jesus that she could not wait to share about Him with her family. She brought her family to church and now they are all baptized members at Source of Life. This precious girl has such a heart on fire for Jesus that she asked Christel if she could become a pastor! Through that conversation and learning she now has the goal to become a deaconess!

But not Pastor Neuendorf, he spent hours after with a young man who just wanted to talk and ask questions about Jesus. It was beautiful. During that time Christel took Karen and Don Neuendorf, Bill (supporter), and Tyler and I to go explore downtown Ponce. During our exploring we ran into a lovely lady named Rosa. She was so overjoyed to see Christel and they embraced in a hug. Rosa knew Christel from attending their church, but hadn't been in some time due to her work schedule. We gathered that evening for dinner at one of the pastors' homes and shared stories, thankful for our time together, we prayed and said our goodbyes. Right now, they are actively working on a new church plant that is ready to launch as soon as funding becomes available and there are five more already being planned. 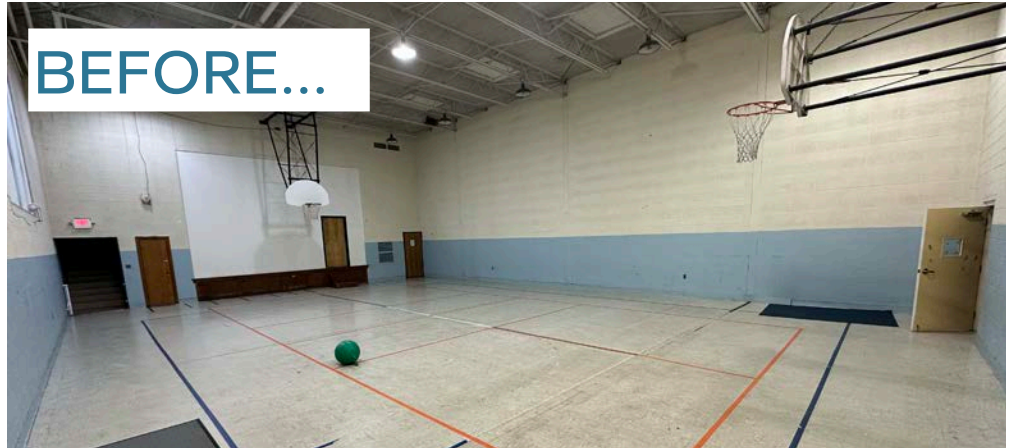
# A New Youth Center!
