Eleanor is part of an amazing family, including her big sister Everly, a joyful and caring second grader at St. Paul. Their strength, joy, and faith have been a true inspiration to everyone around them.

Thanks to the generosity of our St. Paul families, Eleanor's team raised over \$600 through bracelet sales and another \$600 from "Keeping Up with Ellie" team t-shirts, bringing their total to more than \$2,000! On Saturday, May 3rd, Eleanor's team joined friends and family in Lansing for the Cure SMA Walk-n-Roll, an incredible event that brought together 192 participants and raised over \$42,000 to support families and fuel research.

Ellie's team reached some important milestones:

- \$65 funded a day of use for Cure SMA's Advocacy Action Alert Tool
- \$100 provided a medical binder and info packet to a newly diagnosed family
- \$250 funded a care package for a newly diagnosed family
- \$500 supported a teen or adult with a special care package
- \$1,000 funded one full week of critical SMA research

Cure SMA is doing incredible work and is expected to submit **four new treatments** for FDA approval this year. It's truly inspiring to know that our love and support are helping make a lasting impact.

We are so proud of how the St. Paul community stepped up—living out our mission of shining love and reminding us all that, without a doubt, we are better together.

What a year, friends! The school year is wrapping up, and we have a lot to celebrate! Over the last nine months alone, God has blessed St. Paul abundantly. We have averaged more than 354 people in worship each Sunday from August 2024 through April 2025, compared to not quite 340 people in worship in the same period of the previous year. Praise God! What a blessing to have more people gathering for worship and hearing the Gospel among us. We have re-started our building campaign to grow the ministry of St. Paul through our school. We have \$1.62 million pledged as of May 1, and we need less than \$400,000 more to launch the entire project. We are also at 63% of our target goal of \$2.6 million to support the building campaign. This is a great start in only 5 months. I praise God for you and your generosity!



We can celebrate so many more ways that God has been at work in our church and school! Our school continues be place where hundreds students hearing the Gospel from our dedicated and fantastic faculty

and staff. At St. Paul School, students get to know Jesus Christ, discover the truth of the Word and the world, and experience God's love through meaningful connections with teachers, friends, and other staff. Praise God for these students and their families and the opportunities to minister to them! The St. Paul Youth Group is thriving, and Tyler Seehafer is doing an excellent job connecting with 25-30 students in the St. Paul Youth Group. We are excited to send over 30 youth and adults to New Orleans for the National Youth Gathering this summer. Praise God for young people that want to stay connected to the church and for leaders, staff and volunteers, who love them and build them up in their faith!

We had 18 confirmands confirm God's baptismal promises to them on May 4 after they professed their faith on the Friday before. If you want evidence of God at work through St. Paul families, through our school and teachers, and through our church staff, come to the statement of faith night. What a joy to hear these students talk about God's Word means for them in their real lives! God is certainly at work in the lives of these young people. Also, please pray

for these students and their families. Times of transition, like graduating from 8th grade and going to high school, tend to be times when people lose their communities. If you are friends or family—or even just friendly—with any of the confirmands or their families (think also high school and college graduates), reach out to them and make sure they know they are loved by God and St. Paul. That's part of how we shine Jesus' love among one another. Praise God for our confirmands and their faith! Praise God for Pastor Roggow, Tyler, their parents, and the many St. Paul teachers who instructed them in the faith!

There are so many other wonderful things we can celebrate. VBS is coming up, and many helpers and students have already signed up. Lexie Brown has done a fantastic job organizing VBS as well as our thriving women's ministries and milestones ministries. Praise God for these ministries and for children and families taking a next step in their faith! We had over 618 people in worship on Easter Sunday. Praise God for our wonderful choir, brass, and other musicians, especially Dr. Boonenberg, that share the good news of Jesus through music! We were able to bring 500 bagged lunches to Hope Clinc to feed hungry people in our city. We had 27 people clean up flower beds and spread mulch at both campuses during our Spring clean-up day. Praise God for faithful volunteers and servants!

There is so much to celebrate with what God is doing at St. Paul. I'm only scratching the surface in this article. I tell you these things because I want you to recognize all the great things that God is doing through your church, which tells us a bit of where we've been, and helps us to see where God may be leading us to go.

Where are we going over the next year? Later in May, we are bringing together a team of 9 people—men, women, older, younger, people who usually worship at both sites—to discuss where we want to go over the next year. Of

"Hey, Pastor: Why do we start services by saying we're poor and miserable?" By Pastor Aaron Roggow

I get it. Some days, the beginning of the worship service can feel like a downer. Of course, it's not all bad. We begin many services with an Opening Hymn that usually reflects the service theme or the church season. We then start with an "Invocation" (from the Latin word "invoco, " meaning "to call upon"). Just as God placed His name on us in the waters of Baptism when we were Baptized "In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit" (Matthew 28:19), we gather as God's people, as God's church, as the Body of Christ to call on that name. We begin by stating that we're all united under that same baptismal identity, and our gathering and worship are all done in His name at His gracious invitation. We make the sign of the cross to remember that we're baptized into the death and resurrection of Jesus. That's not a downer - that's a joyful reality! But then, right after the Opening Hymn and the Invocation, we often have a moment of Confession and Absolution.

To understand why this may strike some as odd, it helps to reflect on a little history and religious context. Having a moment of confession at the beginning of the service can appear different in contrast to churches that reflect Baptist or Pentecostal fundamentalist theologies in American Christianity. In recent years, these churches have developed liturgies that begin much differently than what you will typically find in a Lutheran church. Within those traditions, you may find services that have a simple structure. They begin with praise music and then conclude with a sermon. This type of focus in worship has roots in both Pietism in the 17th century and Rationalism in the 18th century. (And breaking both of those down would take a whole other article or two, so check out some more history on those if you're interested.) The influence of Rationalism on the church greatly minimized a focus on sin or guilt and led to the loss of a focus on forgiveness and redemption. With this view, sin is reduced to a failure to live up to human potential or a drifting away from what is good. The problematic result of this way of thinking is to see God's Word as a set of rules to teach right from wrong, or as a guidebook to help us be our best selves in the work of God. With that in mind, back to the origin: Why do we begin our services by talking about sin?

God's Word can't be boiled down to a self-help book and it isn't just a teaching of what is right or wrong. The point of the Bible is to recognize Jesus as the promised Messiah who has come to die and rise from the dead to give humanity forgiveness of sins, life, and salvation. When Jesus started His public ministry, after His baptism and

temptation in the wilderness, Matthew records His first word as "Repent!" (Matthew 4:17). In the same breath, He says, "for the kingdom of heaven is at hand." Jesus is calling people to recognize their sin, repent of it (in Greek this word means a call to think differently, have a change of heart, turn away from one way of life and walk in a new direction), because He is bringing His world a new way of life, literally heaven on earth, in His ministry.

So the beginning of the liturgy that we often use at St. Paul reflects the Christian life. In our baptism, we are united to Jesus and given a "new creation" identity. Yet, we live under the curse of sin that we continue to participate in (which definitely results in our poor misery). We don't love God with our whole heart (Deuteronomy 6:5) and we don't love our neighbor as ourself (Leviticus 19:18). Because this is our daily reality, we follow Jesus' calling to repent of that sin and ask for His forgiveness. This same request is brought before God in the Lord's Prayer: Forgive us our trespasses. Martin Luther's explanation reminds us of why we continue to pray this prayer. "We pray in this petition that our Father in heaven would not look at our sins, or deny our prayer because of them. We are neither worthy of the things for which we pray, nor have we deserved them, but we ask that He would give them all to us by grace, for we daily sin much and surely deserve nothing but punishment." That daily sin leads us to daily repentance, remembering our nature apart from God's grace shown to us in Jesus Christ.

Therefore, as we continue to reflect the Christian life in worship, we move from the gracious act of God in our baptism, to our daily struggle with sin. Sometimes, before the confession, we use words from Scripture that speak of what we do with sin in the presence of God. Psalm 124:8, "Our help is in the name of the Lord, who made heaven and earth."; Psalm 32:5, "I acknowledged my sin to you,

Over the past two years, we have raised over \$442,000 for the new playground at St. Paul School. Despite this amazing progress, we are still \$25,000 short of our total amount needed. and I did not cover my iniquity; I said, 'I will confess my transgressions to the Lord,' and you forgave the iniquity of my sin." Therefore, as we gather in worship, we don't gloss over or try to hide our sins. We weekly confess our sin to the one who has taken our sin away.

During Confession, we make statements of our poor miserable nature not to be down on ourselves, but because we have a Savior who has promised to lead us daily as we follow Him. In Luke 9 Jesus says, "If anyone would come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross daily and follow me. For whoever would save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for my sake will save it." We're poor and miserable in our sin because we realize that it always leads to broken relationships, including our relationship with God. We also realize that denying ourselves and following Jesus isn't the easy road either. Repenting of that way of life can be a struggle, but it leads to full life in Christ.

The reason that we begin services at St. Paul with Confession is because the confession is always followed by God's gracious words of Absolution. Your sins are forgiven in the

name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. For you and for me, this is an unambiguous, unconditional statement of God's grace. God comes to us in our worship with His Word of forgiveness so that we would be rescued from our poor and miserable sinful state.

The next time that you come to a service that begins with Confession and Absolution, you'll probably be walking in with a burden of sin for which you are ashamed, sins of thought, word and deed, by what you have done and by what you have left undone. In this you justly deserve the consequences of your actions and can only appeal to the mercy of God. But bringing that burden to the Lord is precisely what He invites you to do! Deny your whole self to be forgiven, renewed, and lead by Jesus. Pick up your cross and delight in His will and walk in His ways to the glory of His holy name. Because God's word of promise that he proclaims to you through the mouth of your pastor is that you are forgiven, set free, and filled with the new life of Christ once again. And to that we can boldly proclaim, AMEN! THANKS BE TO GOD!

In our weekend services on April 5 and 6, we celebrated how God has brought healing to many people through the listening and caring of Stephen Ministers at St. Paul. During the month of March, St. Paul collected donations for sack lunches for Hope Clinic. This included entrees like canned ravioli, tuna, and spaghettios, bottled water, and many many different snacks. This was a wonderful opportunity for our church and school to partner together. People dropped off their donations before and after our worship services and school students brought in snack donations as their March chapel offerings. Then, on Wednesday, April 2 we gathered to assemble the lunches. This was a wonderful opportunity for intergenerational fellowship as we had kids as young as 5 or 6 helping us pack the lunches. We also had some Concordia students



join us as well as a few of our friends from Emmaus. Our original goal was to pack 300 lunches, but because we had such a generous outpouring of donations from church and school, we were able to pack over 500 lunches!

After we finished the packing, we enjoyed pizza dinner and some fellowship before the 7:00 pm midweek Lenten service. The next day, a crew of 11 loaded the lunches into 5 large vehicles and transported them over to Hope Clinic. When we arrived to drop off our donations, the staff

course, we will continue the great things we have been doing for decades in building faith in our church and school. We certainly will continue preaching God's Word, in both Law and Gospel, so that Jesus is always at the center of our worship and life together. But we also want to start looking at what we can do better: How can we better minister to families in our school, both Earhart and the IT house, who aren't part of our church? How can we build on the service that we already do at St. Paul to be a church that looks outward toward our community, that is a "church for others," in Dietrich Bonhoeffer's provocative phrase? How can we strengthen our relationships with one another to be more encouraging and loving as a church? How can we build relationships with others outside of St. Paul and shine the love of Jesus before those who don't yet know Christ? (By the way, if you are interested in being part of one of these teams in the future, please tell me! Everyone can't be part of the group every year, but I'd love for you to be part of planning the future ministry of St. Paul).

We have a few ideas as a staff for what we want to do next year, but we also need input and committment from church members. St. Paul Lutheran Church and School does not belong to the staff. It certainly does not belong to me, to Pastor Roggow, Mr. Burgess, or Sue Francik. St. Paul Lutheran Church and School belongs to the members. The staff are merely servants of the congregation.
