



This Time For Sure!

Some of you might recall an article that appeared in the Unity back in the fall of 2023 called "Why This? Why Now" which had to do with the proposed building project at our school. There was a sense of urgency, and then we had to pause, because – well – things happen. Those things, primarily relating to issues with the City of Ann Arbor, have now been resolved. On January 14, the Congregational Assembly approved going forward with the project, and now our campaign pledge drive is in full swing. This time for sure!

You've received a good amount of information through prior Unity newsletters about exactly what the project involves; those documents and plans are also available on our website, should you wish to look at them again. The purpose of this article, however, is to point out WHY we want to make this investment and for that I want to revisit the 2023 article and that beloved old hymn, "Hark the Voice of Jesus Crying." Most of us are very familiar with that hymn. The first verse asks a question, "Who will go and work today? Fields are white and harvests waiting, who will bear the sheaves away?" Loud and long the Master calleth, Rich reward He offers thee; who will answer, gladly saying, "Here am I, send me, send me?"



The next two verses offer suggestions: If you cannot speak like angels, if you cannot preach like Paul, you can tell the love of Jesus, you can say He died for all. If you cannot rouse the wicked with the judgment's dread alarms, you can lead the little children to the Savior's waiting arms (LSB 827).

The fourth verse is different still. It doesn't ask a (cont'd on pg. 2)

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question or make suggestions. It's more of a warning – to us – the followers of Jesus: Let none hear you idly saying, "There is nothing I can do," while the multitudes are dying and the Master calls for you. Take the task he gives you gladly, let his work your pleasure be; answer quickly when He calleth, "Here am I, send me, send me!"

Fellow members of St. Paul Lutheran Church and School, the souls of men, women and children are dying all around us in Ann Arbor and Jesus is calling us to do something about it. And it's even worse than we thought. At one of the combined Sunday services at Concordia last fall, Pastor Randy Duncan told us that 67% of the people in the greater Ann Arbor community – our home – are unchurched. Not just no Christian church, but no temple or mosque either. 2 out of 3 of the people all around us every day! You know what? Good thing we're here! Because this is a pandemic – and we have the cure. We just need to continue to be part of the distribution effort – and there are lots of patients.

God, as He is prone to do, provides us with opportunities to witness for Him. One of them is through our pre-school. This is a program that St. Paul did not set out to start. God's fingerprints were all over it though. Our school unexpectedly had extra space about 17 years ago and so had the room for a preschool. Our sister church, Divine Shepherd, had a pre-school program but could no longer continue supporting it. The result was that it was moved to our school and has been running (and growing) ever since. "Suffer the little children to come to me." Our own members use this program of course, but over the years it has been a beacon that has attracted children of unchurched families – providing us with an opportunity to witness, and not just to these precious little ones, but to their families. And now we want to do more.

There have been many additions of St. Paul Ann Arbor over our 117 years of representing our Lord and Savior. The 2020's St. Paul has the opportunity to provide space for additional pre-school students. To introduce them to Jesus Christ. To touch their families with the Gospel. To win new souls. We also have the opportunity to continue to enhance the education of our grade school students with a new library/ media center. Our school needs to continue to provide an excellent education in all areas: science, math, technology, language, the arts and most importantly, Jesus Christ. A bigger pre-school will be a bigger feeder for the upper grades. A quality school will not only wonderfully equip the children of our congregation but also the children of any unchurched families that send their children here - and who will learn about Jesus along with science and math. And, oh yes, parking. We need to maintain our assets; not

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exciting sometimes but also part of being good stewards!

And now we've finally launched this ship. We might wish that St. Paul was a speed boat – zipping rapidly along the water on a thrilling ride. But we're more of a freighter: seemingly taking forever to get anywhere, hard to change course, plodding along. But the thing is, after the speed boat ride, what do you have, except wet clothes? The freighter eventually gets to its destination – and delivers the goods. That's us.

Please give generously, over and above your regular offerings, to help this project succeed financially. Please give your time and expertise when asked, to help get things done. And most important of all: please <u>PRAY</u> for this initiative. Not just that we can fund it and build it, but that ultimately we FILL it, and continue bringing the children to Jesus. Why this? To win new souls. Why now? Because the souls of men are dying all around us – right now – and the Master calls for us!

Eyes on Jesus: Looking Forward to Lent

The last Sunday before Lent traditionally celebrates the Transfiguration when Jesus' clothing and appearance is changed, transfigured, before his apostles, and God the Father affirms Jesus as his Son. One verse of that text has always stood out to me. Peter, James, and John witnessed Moses and Elijah show up with Jesus, and they heard the voice coming out of the cloud. And then Mark writes these words, "And suddenly, looking around, they no longer saw anyone with them but Jesus only." They saw no one but Jesus only.

Friends, these words were also written for our instruction. We need to keep our eyes on Jesus, and Jesus only. Too often, our eyes get turned to other things. Sometimes, it's the obvious stuff; name your favorite commandment and its associated sins: pride, anger, lust, envy, selfishness, greed. Sometimes, it's our religious sensibilities that get us into trouble. We can start thinking too much about what I need to do in order to be part of God's people. We can start worrying too much about how much I need to pray or how much I need to give in order to be acceptable in God's sight. And our eyes slowly but surely turn away from Jesus, to the law, to our works, and to our own hearts. What we need is to turn to Jesus and keep our eyes focused on him, for he is the author and perfecter of our faith who endured the cross and its shame for our salvation (see Heb. 12:2). With eyes fixed on him, we will find the joy and peace of being God's beloved children, not by what we do but because of what Jesus has done for us.

The weekend worship series we will be exploring this Lenten season will follow the Gospel of Mark as we seek to keep our eyes on Jesus. We will follow different characters in the Gospel to look at Jesus through their eyes: the misjudging eyes of the disciples, betraying eyes of Judas, the denying eyes of Peter, the sleepy eyes of the apostles, the murderous eyes of the religious leaders, and the worldly eyes of Pilate. Of course, each one of these is also you and me. We too so often misjudge, betray, deny, and ignore not only others made in God's image but even God and his Word. As we explore these perspectives, we not only want to see through their eyes, but also to see through Jesus' eyes. And Jesus sees us not as sinners (though we are that too) but as beloved children of God because of what he has done for us. For a more in-depth study of this series, Lenten devotional booklets are available at all worship entrances.

We hope you'll be able to join us this Lent not only in Saturday & Sunday worship but also during our midweek



Lenten services. Beginning with Ash Wednesday (March 5th), we will have services each Wednesday for five weeks during Lent at 12:10pm and 7:00pm at our Downtown Campus (420 W. Liberty St). Note, we will not have midweek services on April 9th. In addition, we hope you'll join us for a meal and fellowship before each evening midweek service at 5:45pm. The Lenten season will culminate with the joy of Jesus' resurrection as we celebrate the resurrection with the Easter Vigil on Saturday evening and Easter Sunday morning services. This Lent, let's keep our eyes on Jesus! I'm praying that you will stay focused on him and him only.

Hey, Pastor: "What's a Sabbatical and Why Are You Taking One?"

Yes. You read that right. I'm taking a planned sabbatical this summer from the end of May to the middle of August 2025. After conversations with church staff, the Elders, and the Board of Directors, we determined that this would be the best time for me to take this opportunity with very little disruption to our ministry rhythms at St Paul

So, What Is a Sabbatical?

A sabbatical is an extended time to rest, which includes spiritual renewal and physical rejuvenation. The origins of this are found in God's Sabbath rhythms for His people, tied even to the order of creation. He directs them to work six days and rest on the Sabbath. He also instructs them to work, plant, and harvest for six years, and rest in the seventh year. In these Biblical rhythms of work and rest, a sabbatical is intended to give a worker time to focus on connecting with God in his Word. Additionally, workers may spend time reading and studying. Studies have shown that regular sabbaticals result in greater longevity in a pastor's career and reduce the likelihood of pastoral burnout.

What Is St. Paul's Sabbatical Policy?

For many years, St Paul has included a sabbatical policy in the St. Paul Staff Policy Manual:

At the discretion of the Board of Directors, Ordained Clergy or the Principal may apply for a purposeful sabbatical leave. Application for a sabbatical, including a structured plan for the length and content of the sabbatical study, financial plan, and expected outcomes, should be submitted to the Board for approval six months in advance. (Michigan District Guidelines will inform

the response of the Board.) Costs of the sabbatical leave may be covered by grants, special gifts, or budget line items.

My sabbatical proposal was submitted and approved by the Board of Directors in December. Funding for the sabbatical, primarily covering the stipends for guest preachers, has been granted by the Special Gifts Committee

What Will You Do On Your Sabbatical?

I have four major plans for this sabbatical: Spiritual Renewal, Theological Study, Reflection, and Experiencing God's Creation.

- Spiritual Renewal

I plan to focus on Sabbath rest through Bible study rhythms and a prayer retreat at St. Augustine's House in Oxford, MI. During the sabbatical, my family and I will take the opportunity to attend worship with fellow Christians at other churches to be refreshed by others' preaching and teaching, rejoice in the saints' broader fellowship, and glean ideas for ministry. Daily, you, St Paul will continue to be in my prayers.

- Theological Study

Guided by a (lengthy and overly ambitious) reading list, I intend to study various topics that will assist me in developing pastoral skills, foster spiritual renewal, and allow me to research topics of personal interest. I'm looking forward to reading in the areas of Spirituality, Discipleship, Theology & Practice, the Church, Personal Development, and Preaching.

- Reflection

I plan to keep a daily journal on activities, readings, and insights learned during the sabbatical. The final week of the sabbatical will be dedicated to synthesizing the learnings and experiences from the entire period. This time will allow me to reflect on the insights I've gained, the spiritual growth I've experienced, and the plans for applying these learnings in my pastoral work upon my return.

- Experiencing God's Creation

I plan to spend two weeks traveling to National Parks in Colorado, Utah, and Arizona, as the opportunity allows, for a time of restoration and connection with family. If possible, my family and I also hope to get up to Camp Arcadia for a few days to be renewed in "body, mind, and spirit."

But You're Still Going to Do Some Work?

Because of the timing of this sabbatical, I expect to still participate in two pastoral events. I'll attend and participate in the Michigan District Convention which will be held on the CUAA campus from June 22 to 24. I'll also chaperone the St. Paul youth attending the National Youth Gathering in New Orleans, LA, from July 17-24. With these few exceptions, I plan to be away from pastoral duties for the sabbatical period.

Thank You!

I am grateful for the opportunity of this sabbatical. In addition to being an opportunity for rest, it will also serve as an opportunity for growth that will directly benefit my minis-

Celebrating 35 Years of Stephen Ministry at St. Paul

St. Paul is excited to announce the 35th anniversary of its Stephen Ministry! **To mark this significant milestone, a special weekend of celebration will be held on April 5 and 6, 2025**. Services will highlight the incredible work of Stephen Ministry, with participation from current Stephen Ministers. Following the Sunday services, attendees are invited to a reception with light refreshments.

A brief history. Stephen Ministry at St. Paul began in 1990, initiated by Rev. Parke Frederick and Ade Zielke, Director of Family Life Ministry. Betty Muecke, who was on staff at the time, served as the first Stephen Ministry Leader. Throughout the 2000s and 2010s, Esther Jurchen led the group until she retired and moved out of state. Jane Burch then took over, guiding the ministry through the pandemic.

In 2021, Cherise Callahan and Karen Baker joined Jane as leaders, expanding the group to eight members who provided Christ-like care to nine care receivers that year. In 2022, six new Stephen Ministers were added after completing 50 hours of training. The ministry also began sharing Grief Books and Cancer Books with members experiencing these challenges.

In 2023, Stephen Ministers dedicated a total of 129 hours ministering to 12 care receivers. In 2024, the group served six care receivers, giving 109 hours of their time. Some Stephen Ministers also volunteer to pray one-on-one with people after worship services. Last year, four additional St. Paul members completed 50 hours of training to become Stephen Ministers, and Lexie Brown, SPAA Director of Family Life Ministry, trained for 50 hours this past January/February to become a Stephen Ministry Leader.

God has blessed St. Paul with a strong and dedicated

many students will have to transfer and finish their studies elsewhere and that their college experience has been disrupted in this way. However, as I talk with members of the faculty and staff at CUAA, I get the overwhelming sense that everyone wants to give the students who remain the best experience possible in this final semester of the 2024-2025 academic year. I am very excited that St. Paul gets to be part of that and play an exciting role in the training of 6 CUAA church work students this semester. In a recent message to church workers in the Michigan District, President Dave Davis encouraged us to be praying in 2025 "that God would raise up additional faithful workers among us: congregational volunteers, teachers and other commissioned workers, pastors." and "that God would work good things out of our disappointment relating to Concordia, Ann Arbor." I believe God is already answering those prayers through the interactions we get to have with these CUAA students at St. Paul this semester. Your continued prayers for these students as well as all those who have been impacted by all that has been happening at CUAA are very powerful. God is working even in the midst of things we cannot understand. As President Davis frequently encourages us to do, let's keep our eyes on Jesus no matter what!

What is Visual Faith?

Let me ask you a question: How is your personal faith life going? Are you walking along a path totally in touch with God or are you on the path, but asking for His grace constantly because you just can't find the time for Him. Or are you in the group of people that just can't find the path, let alone find time to spend with Him? Life throws a myriad of distractions at us that tempt us away from spending time in the Word. That's where Visual Faith comes in

Visual Faith is a group of simple practices that are designed to have an impact on your prayer life, your devotional life and your worship life. It is not separated out into three boxes. It is an interwoven and Spirit-led journey, tailored to meet you in a way that best meets the learning style that God has created in you. These simple practices help ordinary people like you and me focus on God's Word and prayer. They help us to:

Slow down and focus Remove distractions Remember what you have learned

Have I piqued your interest?

Visual Faith Ministry has four pillars:

- Remember what God has done for us.
- Trust Him.
- Disciple those around
- Share His love with the world.

These practices can be as simple or as in depth as you



want them to be. It could look like, highlighting a verse in your Bible, or scribing (handwriting a Bible verse in a simple notebook), creating a watercolor or calligraphy in the margins of a journaling Bible, and everything in between. All of these are Visual Faith practices. If you are interested in learning about Visual Faith practices, you can talk to one of three Visual Faith Coaches at St. Paul. You Are Following in These Footsteps

How do you know about Jesus? If it were not for others who came before you, what would you know about your Savior? And of all those people, one of the most important must be the Apostle Paul, for whom our congregation is named. Of the 27 books in the New Testament, 13 of them were written by Paul, and the Acts of the Apostles is mostly about Paul's work.

As you seek to know Jesus better, wouldn't it make sense to follow St. Paul more closely?

How many times have you looked at the giant mural in the school gymnasium and wondered about those buildings in the background? Our goal when we designed the mural was to twist the history so that the ancient characters from the story of Paul are situated in the modern context of Ann Arbor. Just as Paul stood on the hill above Athens and looked over the city and its people in need of Jesus, so at our school we stand with the Gospel on top of a hill overlooking the people of Ann Arbor who need Jesus.

On our trip in Paul's footsteps we will stand in Athens, on the Areopagus where he stood, and consider our own calling to proclaim the Gospel of Jesus Christ to the lost. We'll stand in Ephesus, where he challenged the dominance of the goddess Diana. And we will stand in Corinth where he shared the Gospel with the prostitutes who came down to the city from the Temple of Aphrodite.

Consider joining Pastor Don and Karen Neuendorf on a tour of the sites of Paul's ministry. Join us for 11 days of learning more about this amazing man and how the Lord used him to bring Gentiles, like us, into the Kingdom of God.

This eleven-day tour to Greece includes a 3 night cruise to Greek isles, airfare from Detroit, breakfast/dinner daily, lunches on cruise, some excursions, first class hotels and cabins, deluxe coaches, and port fees. The tour is from October 4-14, 2025, and the cost is \$6,475 (based on double occupancy).
