Celebrating the Success of Discipleship Hour

Here at St. Paul, we value discipleship (helping others follow Jesus) very highly. One of the ways we live this out is through gathering around God's Word and growing together in faith and love. In September of 2023, we launched a rebranded version of our Christian education hour called "Discipleship Hour". Because we adjusted our Sunday morning worship schedule, we now have enough time between our services to be able to offer adult Bible studies led by our pastors at both locations! Coffee from the Common Cup and donuts from Washtenaw Dairy were also recent additions.


A total of 136 adults engaged in Discipleship Hour at least once in the fall of 2023 with an average weekly attendance of 52 (for both of our locations combined). A total of 59 kids (under 18) engaged in Discipleship Hour at least once in



the fall of 2023 with an average weekly attendance of 33 (again for both locations combined). These numbers are double what they were in the fall of 2022! It's been very exciting to see so many new faces (cont'd on pg. 3)

in Sunday morning Bible study. The adults began walking through the book of Hebrews and are continuing to do so through the winter. The same material is covered at both locations for both adults and children making it easy for families to bounce back and forth between our 2 locations. You won't feel lost if you miss a week. In January, we polled members of our church to ask which New Year's Resolutions in the area of Spiritual Discipleship were the most interesting or doable and many people expressed an interest in joining a Bible Study or committing to regularly being part of Discipleship Hour. Hey, Pastor: Why Are We Using Incense?

"Let my prayer rise before you as incense..."

Each night before the kids go to bed our family has a moment of Evening Prayer, and we begin with these words from Psalm 141, with the response "...the lifting up of my hands as the evening sacrifice." We don't often burn actual incense in our home, but the image is clear. The prayers we pray, our time with Him, rises up to the Lord as a sweet scent before Him.

The use of incense in the modern church seems to be a mysterious practice. I've been asked over the years questions ranging from, "Why don't we use incense in worship?" to "Why would we ever use incense in worship?" and "Is it okay if I use incense in personal devotions?" So, to answer a few questions (including when/ why we would use incense at St. Paul) here's a short history of the Biblical image and practical use of incense in the worship and prayer life of God's people.

Incense and The Tabernacle

God's direction to Israel concerning the burning of incense begins in Exodus 30:

"Make an altar of acacia wood for burning incense...Put the altar in front of the curtain that shields the ark of the covenant law—before the atonement cover that is over the tablets of the covenant law—where I will meet with you...Aaron must burn fragrant incense on the altar every morning when he tends the lamps. He must burn incense again when he lights the lamps at twilight so incense will burn regularly before the Lord for the generations to come."

In addition to this, frankincense was burned daily to accompany the grain offerings and showbread (Leviticus 2, 24), and incense was used by priests in supplication before the altar for the burnt offering (Numbers 16; Deuteronomy 33). Finally, God mandated the use of incense on the Day of Atonement when the high priest would sprinkle blood in the Most Holy Place. As he entered the space, "[t]he cloud of incense screened the mercy seat and protected the priest from the lethal danger of visual intrusion on God's presence." (Kleinig. Hebrews, 343)

God's direction of Israel's use of incense was multifaceted. Incense was used to visibly reflect the prayers of the people and to show a "visible and sensuous connection between heaven and earth." (Manual on the Liturgy, 279) It created an atmosphere of worship that reflected the temple of God in the heavenly realms. (Hebrews chs.



8-9) The daily lighting of the altar of incense in the Tabernacle highlighted the distinction between the stench of our sin and the sweet smell that the daily sacrifices gave to cover that sin scent. And "The sweet smell of the incense identified [the high priest] with God and associated him with God's gracious loving kindness" for His people. (Hebrews, 451)

Incense in the Early Church

The earliest Christian description of the use of incense is found in the Book of Revelation. Revelation 8 describes how incense in God's presence accompanies the prayers of His people. The use of incense in Christian worship became commonplace beginning in the fourth century. (Davies. A Dictionary of Liturgy and Worship, 197) Since

then, incense has regularly been used as a way of highlighting both the presence of God in the midst of His people and the prayers of the people ascending before Him. Often when the Gospel reading was read, the Gospel procession was led into the midst of the people by candles and incense. (The Study of Liturgy, 231-

232) This practice, which continues in some churches today, recognizes that as the Good News of Jesus is read, "The clouds of incense show cleansing and purification (Numbers 16), covering our sin with the sweet robe of Christ's righteousness." (Manual on the Liturgy, 279)

In the Lutheran Church, incense has primarily been used in the Epiphany season, during the Magnifcat at Vespers, and in connection with the service of Evening Prayer. As mentioned earlier, "The use of incense is appropriate as Psalm 141 is sung" in Evening Prayer (LSB Altar Book, 338) Traditionally, incense is placed on the altar with the emphasis of incense being a biblical symbol for Christian prayer. This incense "may also be brought from the altar into the midst of the congregation" as more Psalms are sung, allowing the congregation to be further connected to the image of the "prayers of the faithful ascending from earth to heaven." (Maschke. Gathered Guests, 293-294; 398)

Incense at St. Paul in the Easter Vigil

The use of incense in the worship of God's people has a long standing tradition, and has been continued in the church especially in Orthodox, Roman Catholic, Anglican and Lutheran churches. Last year at the Easter Vigil service St. Paul introduced the use of incense. The Easter Vigil is an intentionally multisensory service where all of our senses are engaged around the death and resurrection of Jesus for us. (If you haven't checked this service out yet, I invite you to attend on Easter Eve this year). In the Easter Vigil the Word of the Lord is read, the means of grace are prominently emphasized, and heaven and earth meet in a beautiful union. The opening words of Psalm 141, "Let my prayer rise before you as incense...," are also sung as the incense on the altar is lit from the newly prepared paschal candle. Highlighted by scent, taste, sight, sound, and touch, the entire service is centered on the embodied experience of God's people who find the source of their faith and hope in the one who has died and risen again.

This year, we'll once again use (hypo-allergenic) incense in the Easter Vigil service. This unique and particular use of incense at St. Paul is hopefully an opportunity for you to encounter a holistic worship experience, drawing you to gather your prayers with others who through scent and sight pray:

Let the incense of our repentant prayer ascend before You, O Lord, and let Your loving-kindness descend on us that, with purified minds, we may sing your praises with the Church on earth and the whole heavenly host and may glorify You forever. Amen. (LSB, 247)

I love cooking but am not great at baking. I also used to play the Ukulele for about 5 years.


Stephen Ministers and Mental Health Professionals: What's the Difference?

Stephen Ministers are trained and supervised laypeople in our congregation who provide one-to-one, Christ-centered care to individuals facing life challenges. Stephen Ministers listen, understand, accept, and pray with their care receivers.

One of the key distinctions between Stephen Ministers and mental health professionals is that it's the mental health professional's role to try and help clients resolve their problems, while Stephen ministers are there to be present and supportive rather than to solve their care receiver's issues.

Additionally, although there are Christian counselors, traditional therapy is usually not spiritually based. Spiritual concerns may come up in a traditional therapeutic context, but they're typically not the focus from that perspective. The spiritual care that Stephen Ministers offer is unique and can be a very healing, God-sent blessing for care receivers.
